Read a book of historical fiction	Read a current events article from a newspaper. This can be an online newspaper.	Read a graphic novel-one you haven't read in class
Listen to a novel as an audio book	Read a book that won any award like the National Book Award or Newbury Award	Read a novel in a genre of your choosing

We encourage parents to engage in their child's summer reading. We have offered questions to help foster this discussion before you sign off on its completion. Feel free to join us in the Choice summer reading challenge. Maybe make it a game in your own home!

Why did you choose this series to read? Would you recommend it to a friend? Why or why not?	Do you enjoy reading poetry? Why or why not? Did you see any commonalities in the poems you chose?	Editorials are people's opinions. How would you respond to the author of the editorial? Do you agree with the opinion expressed?
What interesting facts did you learn about history? Would this book make you want to learn more about the event? Why or why not?	Discuss the current event topic selected by your student. Why did they choose to read it?	Share a passage from the graphic novel you really enjoyed. Look at the artwork from the book together.
Did you like listening to an audio book? What were some advantages and disadvantages of listening to a book rather than reading it?	Why do you think this book won an award? What rating would you give it and why?	Why do you prefer reading this type of genre? What is your least favorite genre and why?
