Book Synopses

<u>A Place to Call Home</u>: To keep her siblings from being separated in foster care, a 15-year-old girl tries to keep her mother's disappearance a secret.

<u>Up Country:</u> Carl knows he's playing with fire every time he fixes up a stolen car stereo to resell. But he needs the money; how else is he going to get away from his boozing mom and her endless parade of "classy guys"?
